While the Ham Expo was originally created in August 2020 as an alternative to canceled in-person ham radio conventions due to the COVID-19 pandemic, it has evolved into a regularly-held event for amateur radio learning through peer submitted presentations on nearly every amateur radio subject, lively discussion, and interaction.





Static Electricity Again!

his is just a little bit of a brainteaser that I used to present to my students when I was teaching Antennas in the Air Force.

As we know, when a transmitter transmits, electrons flow out the feed line to the antenna. as evidenced by an RF meter placed in the feed line, and are radiated into the great beyond. Of course all of the parameters of complete circuits, grounds and etc apply here so under normal circumstances, most base stations have good grounds and circuits are completed.

Another fact that we

are well aware of is that a positive charge is a deficiency of electrons and a negative charge is an abundance of electrons.

Since pre-World War II, aircraft have carried various types of transmitters and some of them pretty high power.

My question relates to these airplanes. When an airplane transmits while flying, sometimes for hours on end, the continual radiation of electrons

creates a tremendous positive charge on the antenna. When that airplane returns to earth, why doesn't it draw a huge arc that would rival a lightning strike?

Solution

You should never believe everything you are told. The supposition that electrons are emitted from the antenna is totally FALSE!

The voltage field created by the alternating current flowing in the antenna accomplishes electromagnetic radiation. All antenna currents are alternating and so flow out and back in. All other current within the system flows within the power supplies on the airplane.

POTA adventures

Hello RVRN,

This is Rob & Jayne Monsipapa and we live in Mesa AZ and have been RV camping for the last 12+ yrs. We found that 10 days each month (from June to September) in the cool temperatures of the mountains to the north of us was just enough to make the blistering heat of the summer in Mesa fly by. It's normally 30 degrees cooler than the Phoenix valley.




The area is Woods Canyon Lake, 30 miles due east of Payson AZ off Rt 260 (a 1.5hr drive from Mesa). It sits at 7500 ft in elevation. It boasts 50ft+ pine trees, 55-acre lake stocked with trout, electric boat rentals, a nesting pair of bald eagles, osprey, elk and a lot, lot more.

June is the perfect month since it's just before the start of monsoon season which typically starts around July 4^{th} . With monsoon comes very strong rain storms and lightning that lasts about an hour or two. Then it cools off about 10-15 degrees, so when it hits the mid 80's up there, the

15-degree drop is a welcome change.

I've been a licensed ham since 2012 and got my extra in 2016. I also photograph wildlife and have been active in that since 2007. A few years ago, I found a great way to combine my joys in life: RV camping, ham radio and wildlife photography.

The mountains proved a wide variety of wildlife for photographing. I'll put it this way, you will never be short on subject matter to photograph! Since we have been coming to this site for years, I've spent time hollowing out tree stumps at the site, they make great bird feeders. I just find a few long tree limbs that have fallen and they make a great perch for lots of birds. Then I put up hummingbird feeders near trees and I attach small

So, I got thinking, how can I put this all together, something unique, something no one else is doing. So, I started taking a few of my best

photos from each trip/activation and turned

them into 8x10 photo printable QSL cards. The way to get them is to get into my logbook during an activation. Then I send the link out to all the contacts with instructions on how to download the QSL cards. My last activation netted 504 contacts and my June activation was at 764 QSO's made over 11 days. Since I started doing this, I've made friends with a lot of hams that collect my photos and hunt me when I'm activating.





The 7500ft in elevation works great with my EFHW-8010 antenna (by My-Antennas in FL), IC-7300 and bioenno battery packs. I use a sling shot to launch a fishing weight over the 60ft pine tree, then attach an arbor line to the fishing line and bring it back over the tree. Then it gets attached to the isolator at the end of the antenna and hoisted to about 50ft. The coax feed point is then attached to a tree about 1.5ft off the ground for a very nice sloping configuration.

We have made some great friendships along the way with other campers and hams, that we would have never met if we didn't get out and enjoy this great country of ours.







FCC Legacy CORES System Has Been Retired

The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) retired the <u>Legacy version</u> of its COmmission REgistration System (CORES) on July 15, 2022.

The <u>updated version of CORES</u> is now available. In essence, CORES is designed to identify those who hold certain types of FCC licenses and FCC authorizations, including amateur licenses, and organize them in an easily accessible manner under a common FCC Registration Number (FRN) regardless of whether one holds a single such authority or thousands. The new CORES, in addition to assigning individual FRNs, allows holders of multiple FRNs to aggregate them under a single account where the licenses and authorizations, fees and payments, and related actions can be administered from within the same account. The <u>updated version of CORES</u> has been available since 2016, and its use is now **mandatory** for all amateur licensees when submitting amateur-related applications.

Register with the FCC Licensees that do not already have an FCC CORES Username Account must create one with a unique username (a valid email address) and password. After creating the account, when logged in, users should associate their existing FRN or FRNs with this account. Instructions for doing so are on the FCC Registration Help web page. One's FRN is printed on all current amateur applications and licenses, and will not change. FRNs can also be found by looking up one's call sign in the Commission's ULS https://wireless2.fcc.gov/UlsApp/UlsSearch/searchLicense.jsp) or by using the FCC's Advanced Search web page.

The FCC has posted <u>tutorial videos</u> to assist with the transition.

General interest info

Are you following proper flag etiquette?

It has been my privilege to give classes over the years on behalf of the United States Army to various organizations as to the proper U.S. flag etiquette. Here are just a few tips that I would like to pass onto those that fly the flag of the United States of America.

First of all, make sure that the flag size is correct according to the size of the flagpole. If the flag is flown 24 hours a day, it must have direct lighting on it. If the flag becomes torn it must be replaced. If it is frayed on the end, you may have the end folded and sewn once again.

If the colors being to fade, meaning the dark blue becomes light blue or if the red stripes turn pink or if the white stripes turn gray, take it down. It is better not to fly the flag at all than to fly it in this condition.

If the U.S. flag is flown with other flags, then the following applies: If flown in an even number of other flags then it should be flown to the viewers left. If it is flown in an odd number of other flags, then it should be flown in the middle. If it is flown with other flags, then it should be flown higher than the other flags. The blue field should appear in the upper left corner flying towards the front. This would apply to vehicles and uniforms.

I hope this helps those who fly our flag and wish to do it correctly.

Since we are contracted to work here at the campground, we have not had any time to travel, but the work schedule is different this year and provides me with a little more free time than in past years. We also changed to a different cellular provider to get better "WiFi over cellular" than in previous years. This has not only been a big help to my online website and programming work but has also made a very noticeable improvement in signal/voice quality for the EchoLink and digital voice nets that I participate in via the computer.

Speaking of the nets, many of our nets are now using a program called Net Logger to log and display the name, callsign, member number, and location of each member that checks into a net and displays it on other computers that are running the Net Logger program. So if you use the Net Logger program on your computer you can see an ordered list of every participant in the net including the callsign, name, member number, and location of everyone who checks into the net. You can also identify the net control station, who is logging the net, and who is currently talking. There is even a messaging window where you can chat via your keyboard with the net logger or even other participants. You can also use the program to monitor other nets, and you can even look at history files showing all that information for all nets that have used the Net Logger system in recent months. It's quite a neat program.

I hope that by now all members know we have a Constitution Review Committee working on an updated constitution and Bylaws in order to make the RV Radio Network a democratic organization where club members have a voice in how our club operates. The committee includes K4HM-Hank, AC0F-Alan, AI1N-Bob, W3TOM-Tom, W4QMT-Calvin, and W3RF-Bob Famiglio, ARRL Volunteer Council. The committee needs input from RVRN Members. Please provide input to the development of these documents by participating in the polls on our website. So far the polls have shown that our members are heavily in favor of a democratic organization with a board of elected officers and directors who meet eligibility requirements and have limited term lengths. The members have also indicated that Full Members must be licensed amateurs, but they also want to allow Associate Membership for folks who are interested in amateur radio but do not yet have a license. Members have also voted to have Family Membership with voting rights for other licensed family members. Your committee members are working to develop a constitution and By-Laws that meet these requirements. But we still need more input from the members so if you have not already taken the 2nd poll, please do it now – the next poll will go online soon.
